A common misconception is that dog doo is no different than what bears do in the woods. But, not all doo is created equal. Pets have very different, much more processed, nutrient-rich diets than wild animals. Dog doo deposits materials that were never part of the environment they drop them into. That can throw an ecosystem out of balance.

Dogs also carry bacteria and viruses not part of the native environment. That can harm wildlife- and people too! Dog waste has upwards of 23 million bacteria per gram. Dog waste pollutes our groundwater, drinking water, waterways, and the Chesapeake Bay. So, please help keep our watershed and neighborhoods clean: scoop the poop and toss it in a trash can THANKS!

If you think grass stains are bad, dog waste REALLY leaves its mark on the environment! Although it may look like pup piles have disappeared over time or washed away, some microorganisms, such as roundworms, E. coli, and Giardia, can persist and survive in your neighborhood's grassy areas for up to FOUR YEARS if not picked up!

If you have a pet, it's your doody. Please keep areas where people walk, play, and enjoy nature clean and safe by bagging dog waste and tossing it into the trash. Learn More at www.FrederickCountyMD.gov/ItsYourDoody.

We're all part of a watershed- an area of land that funnels water into streams, rivers, the Chesapeake Bay, and on to the Atlantic Ocean. So what happens along Frederick County trails, sidewalks, and lawns affects those downstream.

When dog waste ends up in water bodies, it can cause excessive growth of algae and weeds that make the water murky, green, smelly, and gross. Sometimes, even when the water looks okay, it's still too loaded with disease-causing pathogens to be safe for swimming, boating, or fishing.

So, if you want to enjoy recreational water activities this summer, or maybe you like to eat fresh seafood, or you just want to do what's best for the environment...Pick up your pet's poop. After all, it's your doody.

Pop quiz: How much bacteria is in one gram of dog waste?

Answer: One gram of dog waste can contain 23 million fecal coliform bacteria!

Scooping the poop can also protect people in your neighborhood from parasites like parvo, trichinosis, whipworms, hookworms, roundworms, giardia, coccidia, and other troublemakers. Stay on the pet owner honor roll: pick up and properly dispose of dog waste. #ScoopThePoop #ItsYourDoody

Dog waste is the #3 source of water pollution. With more than 45 MILLION pounds of dog poop produced in Frederick County each year, it can be as toxic to our watershed as an oil spill! So always travel with a plastic bag- and carry that waste back to a trash can. After all, if you have a pet, it's your doody, no matter where you are.
